DAVID'S JOURNEY - CONTINUES

For many years since the establishment of the Readers' Group, I stocked a booklet published in Canada entitled *The End Times - As Revealed to Maria Valtorta*. About seven years ago, this booklet went out of production, and its publishers told me

they had no plans for a new edition. So I decided to put together a new booklet on this theme, for Readers' Group members.

Realizing that the material in the Canadian booklet had been sourced only from the five volumes of *The Poem of the Man-God*, I combed Maria Valtorta's six other books (her *Autobiography*, her three *Notebooks*, the *Book of Azariah*, and her *Lessons from the Epistle of St. Paul to the Romans*) for extracts on the End Times theme, and produced a much more complete selection of relevant passages. This can still be purchased from the MV Readers' Group at a cheaper price than the Canadian booklet. It is entitled: *The End of Times Prophecies from 'The Word of God', through the Writings of Maria Valtorta*. Here is an abbreviated selection of extracts on a particularly vital theme from this booklet's pages:

The 'Warning'

(*There have been many recent speculations from various 'visionaries' around the world, about a (so-called) 'Warning' – an illumination of conscience or mini-judgement for all people on the earth - preceding the 'First Judgement' at death, and the 'Last Judgement' at the End of Time. Maria recorded the following passages...*)

(Jesus says to us through Maria Valtorta:)

'...Go and reject the signs I send you from Heaven, and laugh at the celestial warnings... When you least expect, I will have you experience a sign before which you shall plummet in terror, and the wrath you now unleash against the defenceless will be flung back upon you...' (*Notebooks 1943*, p. 462)

(Jesus says:)

'...I will come tirelessly, and to each individual, to try the doors to hearts...' (*Notebooks 1943*, p. 527)

(*In the following passage, the apostles are discussing whether Jesus ever gets tired of people's misunderstandings in a 'world that is not holy'*)

[And John tells Andrew that Jesus told him:]

'...I must act as if the whole world were of ignorant but good people... The children of Truth will be

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separated from those of Falsehood... This is like a first judgement, not a universal or collective one, but a single judgement...

The first judgement of the mass of human people will take place in the world where men act freely in front of Good and Evil, Truth and Falsehood, [just] as the first judgement took place in the Earthly Paradise in front of the tree of Good and Evil, infringed by those who disobeyed God.

Then at the death of each individual, the judgement already written in the book of human actions by a faultless Mind, will be ratified.

The Great, the Terrible Judgement (Mt. 25:31-46) will be the last one, when the mass of men will be judged again. From Adam to the last man. They will be judged for what they freely wanted for themselves on the earth...'

CATHERINE'S CLASSROOM

Dear Readers,

The task for the class consisted of selecting a saint from the list given, a few of whom were more recent such as St. Pio of Pietrelcina and St. Teresa of Calcutta. The content needed to deal with their family background and life, and reveal in what way the saint was devoted to Jesus – to the Holy Child, His Holy Name, Jesus' wounds, or His Passion, to name a few. During class, in paired presentations, it was evident that all of these saints led very interesting lives with special graces but the common link between them was their suffering. The last pair presented St. Therese of Lisieux of the Child Jesus and the Holy Face. The content was hopeful and inspiring because St. Therese would do charitable acts for Jesus every day and she would move the beads in her pocket to keep count of these deeds which encouraged her to do more. She loved the Child Jesus and she herself tried to remain childlike all her life for which she was rewarded. She was even a doctor of the Church and known as 'the little flower'. The class showed a preference for this method of holiness as it was appealing to Jesus and worthy of reaching heaven...a seemingly easier and doable method than the lives of others even though she died at the age of 23. At the end of the presentation, I read them a Valtorta passage where Jesus talks about St Therese's love for Jesus and her childlike ways.

Jesus says: 'Little Therese - who resting on empyrean clouds, incessantly plucks the petals off roses, and two angels help her to convey her rain of roses over the world - was a true likeness of Me as a Child. [...] My little great flower was Therese of the Child Jesus and the Holy Face. [...] she bore a likeness to my sweet childhood - its gentleness, grace, and simplicity. This was what I wanted, and I

guided her this way with inspiration to give you a model [...] Therese is for all. All can strive to imitate her. Even those who are scarcely formed spiritually. Do not believe, though, that Therese was spared. Oh, no! She shows you a loving, smiling face, the peaceful face of a happy child. But within her, my Passion hollowed her out with a scalpel of fire. [...] And observe that little Therese, with the heart of a hero, had to force herself [...] to give you the impression which I wanted, for her spirit led her towards eagle's flights and fiercer forms of heroism. [...] She wanted 'spiritual childhood' as her form of sanctity, and she became so perfect therein that she really was a second little Jesus.'

(*Notebooks 1944*, pp.392-3)

The class was now introduced to many more interesting and inspiring saints, and they also learnt to recognise them from their images (holy cards). However, in addition to this, it was evident that those close to Jesus had a life and a love of suffering which these students could not fathom in a society where removing suffering through medication and Euthanasia is so prominent...but this would be a lesson for another day.

I planted the seed.

THE MARIA VALTORTA READERS' GROUP ANNUAL GATHERING 2019

Dear Readers,

What better way to describe this year's intimate 2019 Maria Valtorta Gathering than with and through the eyes of a Reader.

Sixteen people attended and it was very lovely to begin the Gathering by going to Mass.

(When we returned to the hall, we listened to Maria Valtorta's equivalent to the Sunday Gospel which not only included the curing of the ten lepers but humorously presented the impatience of Peter, in particular, and the apostles towards the lepers.)

Beginning the first session, we divided into two groups. I was fortunate enough to sit with Catherine together with David Murray and we were asked to select, at random, a passage from MV and to share it with the group.

I am sure the Holy Spirit was working here because strangely, the passages we read tied in with each other. The random passage that I selected and read to the group was the passing of Joseph with Mary and Jesus by his bedside. As I was reading this beautiful passage of Joseph dying, I could really picture the scene in my mind - the absolute loving bond between husband, wife and son. And Jesus who had the power, submitted to God's will, to allow Joseph to go peacefully. We were then able to capture the very human side of both Mary and Jesus in their sense of real, deep sorrow and grief with his departure. Tears were starting to well up in my own eyes and to my astonishment, tissues had to be passed around the group.

In the second session after lunch, we decided to form one group where the readings and the sharing were just as inspiring. We finished the session by reciting the Rosary from the blue booklet, *Praying the Rosary with Maria Valtorta* followed by the Divine Mercy Chaplet. (David then sang a beautiful rendition of a song, unaccompanied in any way, to end the day.)

Many thanks to you, Catherine, for organizing the Gathering and the many hours spent in the lead up to the day.

CLARIFICATION - JUDAS OR LAZARUS

Jesus who was suffering on account of Judas had just been speaking to and comforted by Simon Zealot but then speaks to Maria: '... I was truly a man amongst men. I was the Man. And that is why I suffered seeing the traitor and ungrateful people. That is why I rejoiced on account of those who loved

Me or were converted to me. That is why I shuddered and cried before Judas' spiritual corpse. I shuddered and cried before My dead friend. But I knew that I would call him back to life and I rejoiced seeing his soul already in Limbo. Here... I had the Demon in front of Me. And I will say no more.'

(*Poem, Vol.1, p.448; Gospel, Vol. 2. P.49*)

Notice how Jesus already sets up a contrast between those who loved Him and those who did not. Therefore, it is evident in context that these sentences do not all relate to Judas for the bible tells us that Judas' soul was never saved. While Jesus is commenting on not being able to save Judas' soul who was His apostle, it is contrasted against Lazarus whom Jesus refers to as "My dead Friend" whom He did resurrect after Lazarus had been dead for four days and whose soul was already saved because we are told that his soul was waiting in Limbo (he was not in Hell) till Jesus brought him back to life. Jesus was on his way to see Lazarus in the next chapter. When Jesus says: 'Here...I had the Demon in front of me' he is referring, instead, to Judas who was possessed.

CLARIFICATION – NIKE (VERONICA)

Regarding the presentation given in class on St. Veronica (refer to Catherine Classroom), I noticed the students labelled the title page St. Veronica (Berenike). No other comment was made. So I looked up 'Berenike' because I noticed it ended in nike and came across a podcast by Dr. Taylor Marshall called 'St Veronica in 9 Points: Was she Berenike?' He explains that Berenike (pronounced Beranicay) in Greek (Bernice in English) – means bearer of victory. The b and v are sometimes interchangeable in ancient languages. Abraham was also known as Avraham. So when translated into Latin, it changed to Verenike (pronounced Veranicay). It was even thought this name was transposed onto this woman because Vera means true and iconica means image, so they called her Veronica on whose veil was the image of Jesus.

As I mentioned in another edition of the Bulletin, it is customary in some countries to shorten people's names at the tail end. In some cultures, Christina is shortened to Tina just as Albert is shortened to Bert. **Berenike** and **Veronike** both end in **Nike** which may explain why the woman was called Nike (pronounced kneekay).

In this same podcast, Dr. Taylor Marshall mentions in point 8, that the Nike mentioned in the private revelation of Maria Valtorta in *The Poem of the Man-God* is Veronica (although he says he does not know where he stands on these writings because he is usually sceptical of private revelation). That's okay. I was still thrilled. I only pray that more highly respected and learned Catholics will be drawn with conviction to Maria Valtorta's works one day. Everything in God's time.

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READER'S CHOICE

When reading *the Poem*, I will sometimes stop to ponder a lesson being taught and jot down Jesus' words...At other times, I'll become aware that tears are sliding down my cheeks; or, I'll realize that I'm smiling. But, it wasn't until this year, a month ago, that I actually found myself laughing out loud. [so I would like] to share a joyful moment with other Valtorta readers.

[Visualise] the scene that unfolds in this way.

Jesus, and his followers, are traveling through Samaria, but keeping to roads and paths of the rugged mountains while bypassing towns and villages where the Pharisees are searching for him. Nevertheless, while still on the road, Jesus cures a shepherd's dying son who lives in a nearby village. A short while later when the shepherd discovers that his son has been cured, the village erupts in shouts as the residents spread out looking for the 'Rabbi'. But Jesus' group has already melted into the forest. Later on the road, Jesus also cures ten lepers.

(Maria says:) '...And Jesus leaves the road without going into the little village, He walks through a field, He then crosses a little stream and a path and climbs the eastern hillock, all covered with woods, which He enters with His disciples saying: "We will follow the road walking in the wood, so that we shall not get lost. After that bend, the road runs along this mountain. We will find a grotto in which we can sleep and at dawn we shall be beyond Ephraim..."

And Jesus, in fact, thinks that He will be able to get past Ephraim at the first light of dawn, while the town is silent and its streets deserted, without being seen by anybody. He prudently goes round the town without entering it, despite the very early hour. But when, coming from the little lane at the rear of the village, they arrive at the main road, they find the whole village, I would say, waiting for them...'
